







### PUBLIC











OCEAN AVE. OVERLOOK



Observation Hill offers the best views of the ocean and neighboring vicinity culminating in two distinctive shell-like overlooks that frame iconic views and vistas of Santa Monica and the ocean. It reaches a height of 18', creating a dramatic platform from which to take in views of the ocean and pier. It dually serves to buffer noise from Ocean Avenue, creating an amazingly quire park interior.

The overlooks fabricated from plasma cut plates create a contemporary and striking park edge. They act as beacons for the park, enticing passersby to enter the site.








Over three hundred carefully selected new trees, thousands of new plants, and hundreds of California native and appropriately adapted species are part of the ambitious planting scheme.




