


Located in Southern California, March Air Field Museum is just off the 215 south of Riverside in Riverside County.






Aerial showing the 215 Freeway, the museum, and the airbase.


MEMORIAL TO THE MURDERED JEWS OF EUROPE

The Holocaust Memorial in Berlin, which opened in 2004, stands as a tribute to the millions of victims who perished during the Holocaust in World War Two. Comprising thousands of stone pillars, the memorial's design intentionally creates a space that envelops visitors in a solemn and reflective atmosphere. The architect, Peter Eisenman, designed the memorial with the **primary aim** of evoking an emotional response. Although it differs from memorials dedicated to fallen soldiers, the Holocaust Memorial's design elements can inspire similar emotional reactions from visitors. These features include changes in elevation, a sense of enclosure, sight lines that alternate between unbroken and broken, and the use of monochromatic colors. Together, these elements work to create a space that compels reflection and reverence.













BUBBLE DIAGRAM



SPACE SEEKING


Using the sightliness of the buildings and landmarks of the site can help to define human scale spaces.

Combining the space seeking diagram with previous bubble diagrams can further help to refine the site and define spaces.





This master plan for the site illustrates the different program elements.






SITE PLAN


VIETNAM FIREBASE SITE PLAN






IRAQ WAR BASE




RESTAURANT
