

Case Study 3

Newport Beach Civic Center

Location: Newport Beach, CA Client: City of Newport Beach

Size: 14 Acres

Cost: \$105 Million-140.2 Million

History

Conejo Valley was originally inhabited by Coastal Sage Scrub, chaparral, and Oak Woodland plant communities which gave sustenance to the Chumash Native Americans and wildlife. Plants such as live and valley oaks, ceanothus, ribes, yerba santa, mugwort, strawberries, and salvias were plentiful and offered, medicine, shelter, and materials to make textiles. In 1542, the area was claimed for the Spanish Crown. In 1875, after California became a state, the first post office was built and thus Thousand Oaks began its journey into the modern ara and industrialization. It wasn't until the early 1900s that the area was considered for "community uses" by the Janss Family, whose name is still prominent throughout the valley. The name "Thousand Oaks" was selected as the name of the town in 1964 to honor the oaks that were once abundant in the area.








Native oak trees are the keystone species in California. They not only provide shelter and food for wildlife, but they also lay host to dozenshundreds of moth and butterly larvae. They are also very efficient at carbon sequestration. While Oaks used to be common throughout the state, they are so few in number now that they have a protected status. It is illegal to cut down certain oaks or to disturb the soil within five feet of their canopy. Besides Sudden Oak Death and Oak borers (beetles), Oaks are also threated as a result of development. Pathogens and insects are made worse by climate change and drought. It is not only important to protect these majestic beings, but also to provide them with a sustainable life. A plant is only as healthy as others that surround them, and it is important to make sure to have plant communities and not monocultures. It is also important for people to learn why plants and wildlife matter, and to appreciate being a part of a whole, biologically diverse community.





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

Goals and Objectives

CURATE

CREATE a cultural center in downtown
Thousand Oaks, where people are excited to
bring their families and out-of-towners want to
visit.

- Design multi-use areas that are accissible during day and night, and by all ages.
- Rethink the way we traverse spaces with wide walkways and wayfinding.
- Lay out a safer and more attractive environment for pedestrians.
- -Utilize the space to educate people about who was here first and whawt their relationship with the space was.

CONNECT

CONNECT the the surrounding areas in a visually appealing and accessible manner that will strengthen the community.

- Rethink the way we traverse spaces with wide walkways, wayfinding. and clear access points.
- CONNECT past and present through native plants and interprative signage.
- Food and retail kiosks can be run by local businesses.

EDUCATE AND REHABILITATE

PROTECT and RESTORE local Native Plant communities.

- Protect the existing Native oak trees and establish plant communities.
- Have distinct plant community zones to promote biodiversity.
- Use interpretive signage to EDUCATE people what these plants/communities do, who benefits from them, and how the Indigenous people would interact with these plants.
- Create functional bioswales so the plants can benefit from the rain and will not need extra irrigation.

MINGLE

UTILIZE the existing infastructure of the Civic ARTS Plaza

- Showcase public art throughout the grounds.
- Create outdoor performance spaces.
- Have a continuity of materials used in order to emphasize CONNECTION and INTEGRATION.
