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



Thousand Oaks Civic Center Plaza



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The area around Thousand Oaks was originally inhabited by the Chumash people for thousands of years before European settlers arrived. The Chumash were known for their sophisticated social structure and skilled craftsmanship.



Rancho El Conejo, encompassing what is now Thousand Oaks, was granted to José Polanco and Ignacio Rodríguez in 1803. Mexican rancheros raised cattle and cultivated crops in the area.

1964



Rapid suburban growth occurred in the 1960s and beyond, transforming Thousand Oaks into a residential community. Thousand Oaks was officially incorporated as a city on October 7, 1964, marking a pivotal moment in its history.



Jungleland closed in October 1969, because of competition from other Southern California amusement parks, and because the facility "didn't blend in" with the increasingly urban character of Thousand Oaks.





1994



The construction of the Civic Arts Plaza, designed by Antoine Predock, began in 1992 and was completed in 1994 at a cost of \$63.8 million.



- The structure rises ten stories at its highest point and extends 22 feet underground, anchored in volcanic rock.

CONSTRAINTS

- ① Large parking lot on an elevated platform. Forum Theater loading dock blocks the view of the building.
- Main entrance to the second floor is confusing and not obvious.
- 3 Sunken area on the west side of the building is needed due to windows but is unattractive and under use.
- A Narrow sidewalk interrupted by trees and a bus stop.
- (5) Poor connection to neighboring sites (The Lakes Shopping Center to the east, the future mixed-use development to the west, and The Gardens of the World across the street).
- **(b)** Oak trees on site are protected. No grading or paving allowed under their drip line.
- D Large lawn areas need high maintenance and irrigation, incompatible with oak tree protection.
- B Entrance to the main level is hidden and obstructed.
- **9** Swale around the building blocks access to the site. No access to upper terraces.
- Dry swale area doesn't function and disrupts landscape and connection between the building and exterior space.
- (1) Outdoor event area not used. Trees in the middle block the view to the stage. Dark spots not inviting.
- (12) Poor access to the east staircase.
- Picnic area on the east side is uneven, and tables lack shade.
- The Lakes Shopping doesn't match the current landscape design.





OPPORTUNITIES

- (1) Removing the large surface parking area to create a multi-use space.
- (2) Removing the surface parking area can allow a more formal entrance to the second level.
- (3) The sunken area on the west side of the building can become a connection space.
- (4) The sidewalk can be expanded into a promenade to promote pedestrian circulation, with a bus stop established as a more formal transit point.
- (5) Developments to the east and west allow the Civic Arts Center to expand and integrate with neighboring developments.
- (6) One of the oak clusters could become an educational or conservation space.
- (\mathbf{i}) The large open space in front of the building could be turned into a water feature, and walking and exercise pathways.
- (8) The space between three building walls can be a defined courtyard entrance to the first level.
- (**9**) A bridge and stairs could be built to connect the ground level to the 1st floor.
- Removing the large surface parking area near the loading area could create a multi-use space.
- (1) The outdoor building structure can integrate built and outdoor spaces.
- (12) New stairs with access to the 2nd floor.
- (13) The picnic area can be turned into a sloped lawn for informal picnics and passive recreation.
- (14) Create shaded area in the terrace.





- The Seattle Civic Center Campus includes the Justice Center and Seattle City Hall, spanning three blocks with views of Puget Sound.
- The hilly terrain creates elevated viewpoints and terraces above sheltered plazas.
- Art-glass walls, designed by GGN and Bohlin Cywinski Jackson Architects, capture sunlight, reflect sunsets, and softly illuminate the site at night.
- pathways • Well-defined emphasize an open, transparent, and accessible government.
- A water feature starts at the Justice Center as a small pool and flows through City Hall, emerging outside to cascade along a channel next to the Grand Stairs.
- The water feature ends in a shallow basin with jets that create effects based on weather and activities in the plaza.








ROMANTICIZE

Design Green Spaces Include lush landscaping and green spaces to create a serene and pleasant environment that residents can enjoy.



Improve Accessibility Ensure that the town square is easily accessible to all residents, including those with disabilities, by incorporating ramps, wide pathways, and clear signage.

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Incorporate Local Art and Culture Integrate local art, sculptures, and cultural elements to reflect the unique identity and heritage of Thousand Oaks.

Create Visual and Physical Links Design visual and physical connections, such as landscaping, signage, and architectural elements, that seamlessly integrate the Civic Arts Center with its surrounding context. Integrate Public Transportation Ensure that public transportation routes and stops are conveniently located near the Civic Arts Center to enhance accessibility for all visitors.


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Develop Community Spaces Create public gathering spaces and plazas that connect the Civic Arts Center with other downtown attractions, encouraging community interaction and engagement.
